“A Night With the Frogs” By Chris Gonthier, BMAO Moral Action

Many of us that have been in church for a number of years have heard a sermon titled, “Another Night with the Frogs.” This is based on the biblical account in Exodus when Pharaoh and Moses did not see eye to eye.

The important thing to note here is that Moses was speaking the things of God, and on behalf of God. Pharaoh was fighting the messenger of God, and the will of God. Whereas there was a distinct difference between Pharaoh (the lost), and God’s people, the biblical principle of rejecting God will bring judgment is clear.

The accounting of the plagues shows how thorough God is when he takes action.

Exodus 8:1-2, “And the Lord spake unto Moses, Go unto Pharaoh, and say unto him, Thus saith the Lord, Let my people go, that they may serve me. And if thou refuse to let them go, behold, I will smite all thy borders with frogs:”

God goes into detail of what will happen and how it will happen. It is very clear that God is showing himself in the events of Exodus. Notice God is very serious about his people serving him, so much so that Pharaoh and all of Egypt suffer many plagues due to hardheartedness and rebellion.

As we read through the plagues, we can’t help but wonder why Pharaoh was being so dumb, I mean why do people choose to suffer. The request was simple, just allow God’s people to serve him. One might say, Pharaoh wasn’t choosing to suffer, but the truth is he put himself in the situation to incur the wrath of God.

Furthermore, it was not just the ruler who suffered for his bad decisions, but the whole land of Egypt. We must realize that our bad actions hurt others besides just


ourselves. Pharaoh asked Moses for help, and we might think, “Well Pharaoh learned his lesson.”

When judgment was being imposed, he was ready to repent, but as soon as he felt relief he went back to his wicked ways.

I think back on periods of time in the history of our nation, and I am reminded just how much we act like Pharaoh. When war broke out, the people came to church. The war ended and it seemed as though people no longer needed God.

I look at many more recent events and how churches were shut down and people’s religious choice was, and is, no longer allowed. Since when is it ok to tell people they no longer have the right to serve God as they choose.

With power comes responsibility and leaders must be conscious they are accountable to God. They also must realize that the consequences of poor



decisions effect all of us. Israel has many recorded instances in her history where as a nation she rebelled and God judged her.

I expect lost people to act like lost people, because until they are taught, they don’t really know how to act properly. What really blows my mind is when a supposedly mature Christian will ignore the truth of God’s Word and act surprised at the outcome.

Every day believers choose to rebel against God and intentionally suffer judgment.

One of the most obvious dangers is when parents do not even take their children to church.

Children under the age of accountability and those who have received Christ are often prevented from serving God due to the bondage their own parents have put them in.

Children should not tell parents they do not want to go to church; it is not optional.

Don’t let your children spend time away from home Saturday night if they don’t come to church on Sunday.

Read through the plagues written in Exodus and see why we need to stay true to the Lord. Don’t spend another night with the frogs, because one day you may end up losing your children, as happened in the land of Egypt.

Read through Exodus 12 to see how far God will go when we become hardened towards God.

Land was purchased on North Ninth St. and our present building was built. The first service here was on Mother's Day, May 14, 1989.

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
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"I Was Just Thinkin' "

"ARE YOU GUILTY OF TITHE EVASION?"



Tax season is hot upon our heels. Receipts are being unearthed, pens are flying and sweat is pouring off many a brow trying to meet the deadline and wondering what will be owed.

When Jerry was in accounting, a client received notice that their unemployment taxes were due. In the fine print they saw the tax was referred to as a contribution. Politely they returned it with a note stating they chose not to contribute! Quickly a reply came that it was not a choice!

Yes we must obey Mark 12:17a, "Render to Caesar the things that are Caesar's," but who wouldn't love to choose what to pay the IRS? Most would pay nothing.

Some view taxes as robbing them of money that is rightfully theirs, yet how many Christians think nothing of robbing God? Mark 12:17 continues with, "and to God the things that are God's."

The church has no IRS with a fraud division to go after delinquent titheers and impose penalties or threaten imprisonment. Yet while God's children would never think of not faithfully paying their taxes, far too many Christians fail to see their responsibility and obligation to give to the Lord as He has prospered them.

Did you know that only 4% of professing Christians tithe? .

Do you realize the Lord generously allows us to keep 90% of HIS money, and He only asks for 10% back!

In reality, non-titheers do to God what they accuse the government of doing to them, but the government demands and God doesn't.

There's no denying our tax dollars are misused in some areas, but they still allow us to live in the greatest country in the world with privileges beyond the wildest dreams of most of the world's population.

Without taxes our country would collapse . . . much like many of our churches are doing today due to lack of funds.

I love the old saying, "Excuses are like arm pits. Everyone has a couple and a lot of them

stink!' Tithing is no exception. Let's look at just a few, maybe you will recognize one of yours.

EXCUSE 1: Tithing is a personal thing between God and me

True, it is a VERY personal thing what we choose to do with HIS money. What we do with His money shows Him how trustworthy we are. Just read the parable of the talents in Matthew 25:14-29 if you want to see God's point of view.

It is so personal that it determines how many spiritual blessings He can trust us with.

Luke 16:11, "If therefore ye have not been faithful in the unrighteous mammon, who will commit to your trust the true riches?"

EXCUSE 2: What I chose to do with my money is my business

This translates, "God, stay out of MY finances I can take care of myself." So He does. Suddenly, all sorts of bills, and financial problems arise.

People with this type of thinking get mad at God and accuse Him of not caring for them. The Bible clearly shows man what to do that he might be blessed... but he ignores it.

Despite all our wrong, He STILL provides for his children. Their difficulties stem from their disobedience and leaving God out. He does far above what He should for them in view of their rebellion.

The truth is, people are getting what they asked for, just minus the wonderful blessings He wants to pour out upon them.

EXCUSE 3: Tithing is a Sunday morning thing

I wasn't in church, or I didn't have any money until later in the week. Tithing has nothing to do with a day, a time or a place, it has to do with a heart that obeys God and is committed to Him.

Sunday is when we BRING that tithe to the Lord. He will gladly receive it any day or time. It is a sincere expression in a very materialistic world to show one's true belief in God and His power. After all, how can a

person say they trust the Almighty God to save their soul, but cannot trust Him to provide for them financially? Such double mindedness shows serious doubts as to how much they truly believe God is who He says He is.

EXCUSE 4: I'd like to tithe but by the end of the week I have no money left

Too much week not enough money? This is the result of tithing incorrectly. The minute we receive a paycheck or any income, at that very moment, we should set aside 10% for the Lord. That keeps it safe and sound from being spent. It should be the first check we write no matter what day it is!

Would a responsible individual wait till the day their electric bill is due to see if there is money to pay it? No, they would set aside funds as soon as the amount is known.

Why not even more so with God's money? I am not advocating not paying our bills, but I would rather owe someone else than God. God can help pay our bills; our creditors will never help us pay God back.

EXCUSE 5: I would like to tithe but I just can't afford to

Look at it this way, we can't afford not to! Debt is the reason Christians believe they can't tithe, which is a by-product of misusing God's money. And just admit it, a lot of bills are due to folks buying things they don't need.

So many wonder why they are having such a tough time financially – it is because they are robbing God! Tithing when finances are short shows that God is more important than anyone else. How arrogant to expect Him to provide and a take care for them when they rob Him!

That's a pretty sad deal when a person won't even give Him the measly dime He asks for on every \$1.00 He blesses them with!

We aren't giving Him anything out of our good graces; we are handing over a small portion of HIS money that HE has loaned us. We steal from Him when we keep it for ourselves.

Get the idea? It is NOT OUR MONEY.

EXCUSE 6: When God blesses me with more money, or I get my bills paid off, then I can tithe.

When hard times come, giving to God first shows faith in Him. Such faith opens the door

“Healthy Church Leadership”

“Pity the leader who is caught between unloving critics and uncritical lovers.”

John Gardner applies this statement to spiritual leadership and the importance of good godly counsel. It is crucial to not only listen to those who will tell you what you want to hear but also to those who have the liberty to say what you need to hear.

It has been said that, “Flattery will get you nowhere.”

Proverbs 28:23 says, *“One who rebukes a person will later find more favor than one who flatters with his tongue.”*

God guides us through the authority of Scripture, the guidance of the Holy Spirit, and the counsel of other believers.

The book of Proverbs has much to say about the danger of not listening to the wisdom of others:

Proverbs 11:14 - *“Without guidance, people fall, but with many counselors there is deliverance.”*

Proverbs 15:22 - *“Plans fail where there is no counsel, but with many advisers they succeed.”*

John Gardner’s quote reminds us of the reality that criticism can crush you and applause can corrupt you. Enlisting the advice of godly mentors can guard you against foolish decisions. They can save a lot of heartache if you’re willing to listen and prayerfully consider their input.

A mentor is someone who has been where you want to go and is willing to help you get there, so think about who knows what you need to know and find them. Then make sure you have a teachable spirit and willingness to learn.

Are you open to learning from others? Are you willing to listen and accept wise, sound counsel?

Perhaps the biggest obstacle that keeps us from accepting advice is our own pride. You can easily fall into the trap of believing that as the leader you have to produce all the answers, but you do not. Look to others and recruit a variety of godly counselors.

God has placed many around you who have unique expertise and experiences. The core principle of spiritual leadership is trusting God as He speaks to us through the wise counsel of other believers.

Give believers in your circle of influence the freedom to express their opinions. The key is not that you always agree but that you discuss and decide together as you prayerfully consider decisions that need to be made.

You need confidants who will speak the truth you need to hear when you need to hear it.

You do not need “yes men” but men who love you enough to step into your office, pull the door closed, and say, “We need to talk.”

You need leaders who love you enough to confront you privately and speak into your life before you make a decision that could damage you or the church.

Invite people into your inner circle to discuss and give feedback. If you’re a leader, have you developed a culture where opinions are valued and desired?


The time will come that you will be required to make difficult decisions. They must be faith-based, spirit-led, and influenced by the godly counsel of others. Have people close to you who are willing to ask you the hard questions.

It has been said if you want to go fast, travel alone, but if you want to travel far, make the journey with others. Consider the beauty of a triad of people you can bounce ideas off of and give you their perspective and concerns.

Be willing to slow down and be sure before you press forward. One bad decision can get your church off the course God desires. One bad decision can place you on a boat fleeing God’s calling and headed for Tarshish instead of Nineveh.

Henry Blackaby makes a great point: “Jesus didn’t forsake Judas, but neither did He allow Judas to sidetrack Him from His mission.”

You should never abandon those whose advice is not spiritual, but you also cannot allow detractors to derail what God has called you and your church to accomplish. When God has made clear His direction, delay is an abdication of leadership.

The time will come to make a decision that is not easy. Have you heard from the Lord? Are you able to recognize His voice?

If you make decisions based only on what seems the most advisable, it is very easy to settle for something inferior to God's best. Seek God's guidance in prayer, confirm His direction through Scripture, affirm it through other believers, and be willing to evaluate it through your circumstances.

Just so you know, spiritual leaders

never begin with their circumstances (good or bad) when deciding God's direction.

Seeking wise godly counsel can save a lot of heartache and disappointment and help you accomplish more because there is strength in numbers. God wants you to fulfill your calling instead of dying to the potential He has placed within you.

In Exodus 18:14, 17-18 Jethro gives his son-in-law Moses some of the best advice in the Bible:

“What is this thing you're doing for the people? Why are you alone sitting as judge, while all the people stand around you from morning until evening? What you're doing is not good . . . You will certainly wear out both yourself and these people who are with you, because the task is too heavy for you. You can't do it alone!”

SOAR Speaker Shares Story of God's Call

I was raised in church. My dad was a railroad engineer so he was gone a lot, but my mother always made sure that we were in church on Sundays.

Even though I attended church regularly and knew quite a bit about the Bible as a child, I did not give my heart to Jesus until I was a junior in high school. And that changed everything!

Several months after being saved, I went to a church camp in Colorado, and it was there, on a Thursday night, that I felt the Lord calling me into full-time ministry. I wasn't really sure how that would look; I just knew I wanted to surrender to that calling.

The Sunday I returned, I let my pastor and the church know I had surrendered my life to full-time ministry and they were, of course, very supportive. In fact, my pastor wanted me to begin preaching, so

I, along with two other guys my age, rotated Wednesday nights preaching at Central Baptist Church in Lufkin, TX.

I'll never forget my first sermon. I wrote down word for word what I was going to say, hoping I wouldn't be too long winded.

Scared to death, I got up that first Wednesday night and preached for a whopping two minutes!

I'm sure there are people in my church now who wish I could keep my sermons under to two minutes.

After graduating from high school I met a girl who took me to her brother's graduation service at a little college in Jacksonville, TX.

I was raised independent Baptist so I



had never heard of this college, but for whatever reason, there at that graduation service I knew this was the college God wanted me to attend.

I had three of the best years of my life at that two-year school. One of the neatest things at Jacksonville College was the opportunity to meet many other young preachers and travel to fill pulpits on Sunday mornings.

I'll never forget driving those country roads headed to little country churches way out in the middle of nowhere to preach.

I met some of the best people I've ever known at those churches, and I ate a lot of good food.

After that first year at Jacksonville College I served in a summer youth ministry internship with Gary Willis at Keltys First Baptist Church in Lufkin, TX.

We hopped on a bus and did a youth choir tour all the way up to Nashville, TN, where I attended my very first SOAR conference.

That was 30 years ago. I'll forever be grateful to my pastor who gave a young high school boy the opportunity to get up and preach even though it was probably the worst preaching that church had heard.

And I'm also grateful to a college that encouraged young preachers and opened doors of opportunity to spread our wings and attempt to fly a bit. Sometimes flying right into a tree, but flying nonetheless.

SOAR 2022 will be focused on God's call on our lives. God's call to salvation, God's call to serve, God's call to missions and God's call to ministry.

This year's SOAR could have a huge impact on this generation of students and our churches for years to come.

for Him to take care of our needs. Too often Christians slam His hand in the door when He is trying to reach out and give. Then they wonder where He is and why things are getting worse!

EXCUSE 7: Tithing is an Old Testament law and we are no longer under the law.

Abraham gave to Melchizedek (Genesis 14:19-20) before the law and God blessed him. He later affirmed tithing in the Mosaic Law (Numbers 18:21). New Testament tithing is clear in Matthew 23:23, . . . for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weightier matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone.

Rarely do believers question whether the 10 commandments should still be obeyed, but arguments arise in this area of money. Should Old Testament laws no longer matter, then which ones will you choose not to obey? Thou shalt not kill? Thou shalt not commit adultery? If a person arguing this gives 10% or more regularly then their issue is not monetary.

But if those disputing tithing are giving less than 10%, then one needs to look at WHY they find this scripture so offensive. Could it be a faith issue? Could it be a control issue? Could it be a greed issue? More likely it is a spiritual issue. Seriously consider doing a heart check. A good place to start would be 1 Timothy 6:10 and Matthew 6:24.

Face it, churches everywhere are in trouble financially. A shameful number of God's people ignore His plan to provide for His church. Everyone wants a nice church and faithful pastor but too few want to support it. No church should ever have a money shortage or should pastors be forced to work a second job to support their families. These are signs that there is a problem in the hearts of the people.

Christians want to pick and chose what they will withhold from God, but they don't want God to withhold anything from them. God's churches need less tippers and more tithers. Which one are you?
